What is the purpose of this update?

This document tells you how the Core Inflation Portfolio has performed and what fees were charged. The document will help you to compare the fund with other funds. New Zealand Funds Management Limited prepared this update in accordance with the Financial Markets Conduct Act 2013. This information is not audited and may be updated.

Description of this fund

The objective of the Core Inflation Portfolio is to mitigate the impact of inflation on your investment over the medium and/or long term by investing in income and growth assets using an active management approach. It is anticipated that the fund will mainly hold inflation-sensitive assets including cash and cash equivalents, Australasian and international bonds, and Australasian shares. It may also invest in other permitted assets.

Total value of the fund \$101,601,083

What are the risks of investing?

Risk indicator for the Core Inflation Portfolio:



The risk indicator is rated from 1 (low) to 7 (high). The rating reflects how much the value of the fund's assets goes up and down. A higher risk generally means higher potential returns over time, but more ups and downs along the way.

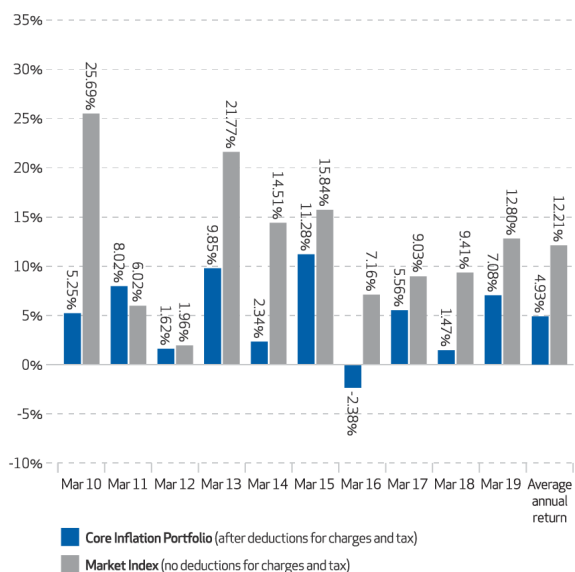

How has the fund performed?

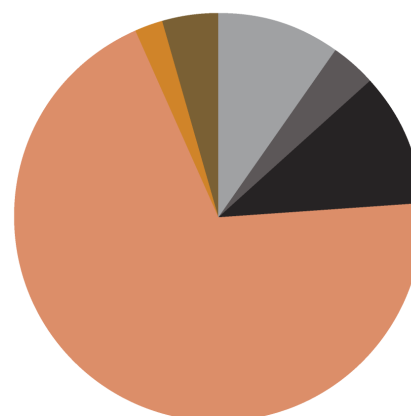
Example of how this applies to an investor

Liam had \$10,000 in the fund at the start of the year and did not make any further contributions. At the end of the year, Liam received a return after fund charges were deducted of \$708 (that's 7.08% of his initial \$10,000). Liam did not pay any other charges. This gives Liam a total return after tax of \$708 for the year.

The top 10 investments make up 61.98% of the fund.³

NZ Funds actively manages the foreign currency exposure of the fund. Where the fund holds assets denominated in a foreign currency, NZ Funds has the choice of whether to hedge back to the NZ dollar or retain a foreign currency exposure. The fund may also take active foreign currency positions by holding non-NZD cash and/or foreign currency derivatives. As at 31 March 2019, the fund's foreign currency exposure was 1.95%.

Notes

2. The fund is able to invest in a wide range of assets and does not have a target investment mix. For the purposes of this update, the target investment mix has been compiled using the actual investment mix. NZ Funds is an active investment manager and as a result the actual investment mix and target investment mix will change in the future and changes may be material.
3. The top 10 investments have been compiled using a balance sheet approach. This differs from the approach used in compiling the actual and target investment mixes, which include the impact of derivatives.
